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

Have you heard about the **ABILITY** Bus?

ABILITY is a local bus service operating in your area, covering West Northants with a fleet of ten vehicles based at Caswell, near Towcester.

As a not-for-profit social enterprise (similar to a charity) providing bus services for the rural areas across West Northamptonshire.

One passenger says, "It's a very friendly service, other passengers on the bus are very friendly and the driver always has a laugh with us, we love going out on the bus, it's really good value, we go to Northampton every week".

The bus service is available for **anyone** who needs it. Our youngest passenger is 6 months old and our eldest is 102. Getting out just once a week allows social interaction and a marvellous boost to your wellbeing.

We take people to local towns to enable them to do their shopping, have a wander around the shops and attend to any business they have in town, before returning home.

We are a fully registered and compliant bus service, registered with the Traffic Commissioner. All drivers receive MiDAS training and are DBS checked.

Passengers with Concessionary bus passes travel FREE after 09:30, fare paying passengers are able to pay in advance on board the bus.

Action with Communities in Rural England (ACRE) appoints new Chief Executive



Corinne Pluchino, an experienced leader with a lifelong interest in rural affairs will join the charity in May. She replaces Richard Quallington who <u>announced</u> his departure last year, having spent 8 years in the role.

Corinne is currently Director of Fundraising, Marketing and Communications at WWT, the charity for wetlands and wildlife. She has previously served as Chief Executive of Campaign for National Parks and has held senior roles with SSAFA, the Armed Forces charity and Hill & Knowlton, the global communications consultancy.

She is also a former trustee of CPRE, the countryside charity. With expertise in communications, public affairs, and stakeholder engagement, her experience includes housing and development, environmental, farming, health, and social care issues. She aims to put the needs and interests of rural communities firmly on the next government's agenda.

Speaking of her appointment, Corinne said "I am thrilled to have been given the opportunity to join ACRE, and to work with its network of thirty-eight member organisations that are dedicated to supporting rural communities across England. It is essential that the significant challenges faced by many people living in rural areas are better understood and they are not disadvantaged by where they live. There are also real opportunities to achieve change through positive action. I am looking forward enormously to working with the ACRE team, the wider network and our partners to deliver these ambitions."

James Blake, Chair of ACRE said, "We are delighted to be welcoming Corinne to ACRE at this important time for our organisation. With the prospect of a new government on the horizon, it is essential we have someone of Corinne's calibre in post to build our reputation for championing the needs of rural communities, as well as continuing to deliver for our members."

Corinne will be joining ACRE at a time of adaptation in its network where members have stepped up to help rural residents through the cost-of-living crisis; delivering new projects to improve health and wellbeing, supporting individuals with fuel poverty, and developing a new network of Rural Housing Enablers to help communities secure more affordable homes.

Corinne will take up her appointment at the end of May.

ACRE is the national body of the ACRE Network, England's largest rural grouping of community support charities which support initiatives that equip people with the knowledge, skills, and connections needed to improve their local community.

Only 1 in 6 rural councils have made use of key affordable housing option

Only a fraction of rural local planning authorities (17%) have made use of Rural Exception Sites, a mechanism introduced to boost the supply of affordable housing in rural areas, according to new research by University College London (UCL) on behalf of the Rural Housing Network.



Rural Exception Sites were introduced in 1991 to enable the development of affordable homes on underdeveloped land that would otherwise be restricted for residential development. The sites have the potential to provide much needed affordable housing amidst the escalating rural housing crisis.

The past few years have seen housing prices in the countryside rise at a quicker rate than in urban areas placing additional strain on household finances and forcing many people to move. In turn, this can affect the viability of local businesses and services. According to recent government statistics, the most affordable homes in rural areas cost 8.8 times earnings compared to 7.6 times in urban areas (excluding London).

Out of 145 rural local authorities, only 25 used Rural Exception Sites to deliver affordable homes between 2021 and 2022, resulting in 546 homes being built. However, nearly 3,000 affordable homes could have been developed if the vast majority of rural councils had utilised rural expectation sites in the time period, presenting a massive, missed opportunity.

The research looks at some of the reasons why Rural Exception Sites haven't been fully utilised and outlines a number of recommendations to help successfully deliver affordable homes in rural areas including emphasising increasing the support and resources for Rural Housing Enablers. However, thanks to recent funding from Defra, the <u>ACRE Network</u> is working with members to create a <u>network of RHEs</u> to work with communities across England.

Affordable housing in rural areas boosted by launch of new scheme

Communities in Northamptonshire's rural areas are set to benefit from a new package of government funding announced in November designed to unlock affordable housing opportunities.

The funding comes from a national £2.5 million government fund to support the work of Rural Housing Enablers who broker conversations between residents, councils and builders about securing housing that meets local need.

The scheme, which is being delivered by Action with Communities in Rural England (ACRE) on behalf of Defra, will help boost the supply of new, affordable homes across England. Northamptonshire ACRE, the local ACRE Network member, is one of the beneficiaries of the funding and will be developing a new Rural Housing Enabler role as a result.

This month the charity appointed Rural Officer Jenni Hedges, and Rural Fieldworker Claire Yow into the Rural Housing Enabler post. Jenni and Claire are hugely experienced in working with local communities and supporting them to vocalise their needs. They will be looking for innovative partnerships with Parish Councils, community groups, Registered Providers, the private sector and others to increase the pipeline of rural affordable housing schemes in Northamptonshire and to support delivery.

Jenni and Claire will be working closely with Philippa McKenna, Project Delivery Manager at Midland Rural Housing, who is the consultant engaged by NACRE to provide the housing expertise for this project.

Architect, Steve Wolstenholme from Stanhope Wilkinson Associates, will talk about community buildings in the context of environmental sustainability.





Impact Community Carbon Calculator

The Centre for Sustainable Energy (CSE), a leading climate emergency charity, has developed a community carbon calculator. Impact is a digital visualisation tool that helps you understand community's vour carbon footprint. It draws on more than 30 datasets to estimate the total of greenhouse amount produced directly and indirectly as a result of everyday human activities in the given locality - heating homes, using electricity, transport, producing and distributing food, disposing of waste, etc.

It works for parishes, wards and local authority areas and helps identify the areas where taking action to tackle climate change can make the biggest difference.


Northamptonshire Rural Crime Strategy 2023-25

Instead, rural crime is a term that covers many different crime types and incidents that affect rural communities.

Northamptonshire Police considers a rural crime to be:

A crime or incident type which occurs in any geographical area ordinarily described as 'rural', and where the criminal activity is more prevalent in, or unique to, rural areas.

NORTH NORTHANTS SUSTAINABLE FOOD NETWORK



Grants from Northamptonshire Community Foundation

Rural Community Needs fund

Northamptonshire Community Foundation has opened their Rural Community Needs fund, which came out of their 'Shining a Spotlight on Rural Community Needs' campaign last year. The aim of this fund is to address urgent needs in rural communities such as access to community transport, fuel poverty, refurbishment of community building and equipment, wellbeing and health services, activities and education services for young people and support for older people.

Anchor Community Connection Fund

The Anchor Community Connection Fund has been established to support local organisations, causes or programmes that bring people together to share food and strengthen community connections.

The programme's main objective is to make a positive difference by connecting communities through food. Therefore, eligible projects must be focused on foodbased activity.

This fund will award grants of up to £3,000 and is a rolling programme. Organisations can apply at anytime until the fund closes on Friday 29th March. More details <u>here</u>.

Footie for All Fund now open

Tesco Stronger Starts (managed by Groundwork UK) funds grants for healthy food and activities for children across the UK. They have partnered with The Sun to power their Footie for All campaign with the Tesco Stronger Starts programme to create a Footie for All Fund.

They will be providing £150k in grants to grassroots football clubs across the UK as well as raising awareness of the importance of children having opportunities to thrive through opportunities for more physical and mental wellbeing.

The Footie for All grants will support grassroots clubs in providing more spaces, better equipment and new kits – anything they need to help support children in their local communities.

FCC Community Action Fund

The FCC Community Action Fund provides grants of between £2,000 and £100,000 to not-for-profit organisations including:

- A registered charity operating a community facility
- A church or parochial church council
- A parish/town council, a management committee or user association acting on behalf of a parish or town Council
- A local authority
- A CASC registered sports club

Requires <u>contributing third party (CTP) payment</u>. Projects must be within 10 miles of an eligible FCC Environment waste facility (for projects in Northants, the relevant FCC waste facilities are at Weldon N17 3JG and Bletchley MK3 5JU).

- help more people to reach their potential, by supporting them at the earliest possible stage
- support people, communities and organisations facing more demands and challenges because of the cost-ofliving crisis.

Morrisons Foundation

The Morrisons Foundation supports registered charities delivering projects that make a positive difference in local communities. The Foundation awards grants of up to £10,000 for charity projects and match funds the money that Morrisons employees raise for their chosen charities.
