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

INTRODUCTION

The last village survey that Northamptonshire ACRE (NACRE) carried out was in 2011 and it gave a picture of villages that were having to adapt to new challenges in order to keep their community going.

Transport, provision of services and the environment were all identified as key issues for many villages. With much new development it was felt it the right time to complete a new survey. We asked a range of questions about life in a rural community, in a brief survey to:

- inform, develop and enhance our current toolkits to support local future needs including climate change, transport, energy and more recently those seeking refuge/asylum, in difficult global circumstances.
- highlight any issues that communities may have experienced as a result of the impact of COVID-19.
- establish local evidence of how communities are currently faring.
- identify what current services and support exist in parishes and rural communities in comparison to 10 years ago and how they are evolving.

SUMMARY

Our survey was formulated by listening and learning from local people. The survey focused on ten key areas helping to build up the picture of rural life in 2021.


The aim is to establish local evidence to assist in targeting rural needs. A robust knowledge base is needed to champion rural interests and also to help policymakers such as Local Authorities and other statutory agencies make provision for rural needs in Northamptonshire today.

The survey was sent to 331 Northamptonshire Parishes, with 48 questions relating to the following areas:


- Your community






What Facilities do our villages have?

Places of worship, village halls and green spaces remain an important feature in rural life. This remains unchanged since the last village survey in 2011.






Lost Facilities

In the 2011 survey 7% of villages reported that community facilities had closed in their village, in 2021 this figure was up to 12%. The loss was similar in the North (12%) and West (11%) reporting that they had lost facilities. However villages in the North were less likely to have the facilities to begin with.


How have your local facilities been impacted by Covid 19?




The impact of the pandemic

Respondents reported that facilities in their village closed during the pandemic and that this had a knock on effect on income. The impact of this is likely to be ongoing as many facilities reported that they were still seeing less use.


This was an open ended question in the survey, and whilst only 3% mentioned an increase in outdoor recreation, the actual number is likely to be much higher.



80% of respondents in the North had no businesses in their community. The breakdown of businesses remained broadly the same as the last survey (2011) with no major changes.



The most common businesses in the 'other' category were pub (29%) hairdressers or barbers (13%) community café (15%).



Although the North and West lost similar numbers of businesses, the North reported less businesses to start with.



Impact of COVID on business

The story in Northamptonshire villages reflected the national picture, many businesses were shut due to restrictions and this caused a loss of income and some to shut permanently.


Some villages reported that the pandemic helped local grocery stores by boosting business. Some businesses are suffering long term impact and are still seeing loss of footfall.






PUBLIC SERVICES & EDUCATION






The 2011 survey didn't include defibrillators, however it is fantastic news that 87% of respondents reported their community had a defibrillator in 2021.



PUBLIC SERVICES & EDUCATION



Unsurprisingly change in availability of mobile technology has had a direct impact on the number of phone boxes across Northamptonshire.

Aside from phone boxes, libraries were the most lost public service, with 9% closing in rural communities. To combat this some communities have created community libraries- often in decommissioned phone boxes.



What Impact did COVID-19 have on your village services?


We had planned first aid training (for our defibrillator) and this has been postponed. Only the mobile library stopped visiting.


Brownies/Guides has been stopped.

Loss of Library and no meetings of the Youth Groups. Particular difficulty with young children who have missed sports clubs and school.

School has coped very well even with the uncertainty & has also helped greatly with the education of the children of key workers from other parishes.

Toddler playgroup stopped during Covid and might struggle to 're-establish.





The bus service was in danger of being lost due to funding issues. It is currently being funded by the Parish Council in conjunction with other Parish Councils from nearby villages.

Daily Bus service stopped but we still don't know why it was not viable, when most days it was filled with bus pass holders.

People, like many others in rural villages, are dependant on their own cars for shopping, medical centre etc.

Community monthly mini bus scheme has ceased,

Bus service has been radically reduced over the years.

Free Tesco bus service lost, Tesco said it was a policy change.

Volunteer transport scheme is sporadic and not very well used as a result.

The bus service has actually increased & we are installing new & more protective bus shelters to encourage use.

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HOUSING

The previous survey looked at affordable homes, and sheltered accommodation and did not split the data between North and West.


There is little change in the % of respondents reporting these housing types in their community.

Affordable Homes 2009- 34% 2021- 30%


Sheltered Accommodation 2009- 20.9%






ULTILITIES




Villages in the North were less likely to have a gas connection.



Oil was the most common form of heating when gas was not available.

UTILITIES



This was a new question for the village survey, no data is available for 2009

Only 2 communities (of those that responded) had communal electric car charging points.




Various properties have solar panels. The village hall is looking into an air to air heat pump.

Limited use of Solar Panels & we are searching for grants to Solar Power the village hall.

Solar panels on the Community Centre. Installing Electric points for e cars is in the pipe line.

One or two outlying farms have private solar panel areas or ground source systems.


COMMUNICATION



What forms of communication do you have in your village?

This was a new question for the village survey, no previous data is available.

Villages are using multiple different methods to communicate with each other.



Has COVID-19 changed the way your village communicates with each other?

The pandemic has increased digital communication methods in communities. Some respondents reported that this has improved communication and created a more social community. Other respondents expressed concern that digital communication risked excluding older people. Digital access and literacy is a key concern for Northamptonshire ACRE.


We set-up a WhatsApp 'help line' during the Covid outbreak. The Parish Clerk has telephone and email contacts for 95% of those with digital connections, this enables us to broadcast messages quickly to most residents. Hard-copy is delivered to those without email. ironically, the latter tend to be very elderly and probably in most need of connectivity.

The social cohesion of meeting face to face has severely impacted on many residents, especially those new to the village. However, neighbourliness is still much in evidence.


Yes, has become friendlier and more pleasant to one another. Not so much of a social divide.

A community broadband service was started in 2003 by local volunteers which over the last 18 years has grown into Tove Valley communities superfast broadband service, still run entirely by volunteers: tovevalley.com.

We are at the start of the process and it's proving lengthy.

One of the estates in the village have got together to sort out fibre in their area..

BROADBAND



If your community building has an broadband connection what is it used for e.g. preschool, e.g. parish council meetings, e.g. drop-in sessions for the community



The connection pot is installed outside but there is no definite demand for broadband in the village hall, so it has not been installed in the building.

WiFi in the Village Hall for all users including Parish Council meetings.

Gigaclear's "fibre to the premises" has only just "gone live" in the last few days, and they are now offering us a "community hub". The management committee of the Village Hall will now be considering this offer.


The broadband service has been installed in the village hall and pub as a community service and is free to all users.


Broadband is available to all users of the hall.



Church with a one handed clock.




Nene river and canal and has lots of footpaths so is visited by walkers.

Some of the walks and locks on the Grand Union Canal are included in the Northamptonshire Walks list online. We also have the Berry/Bury which is one of seven surviving medieval ringworks in Northamptonshire. It has a long history of occupation and is in essentially undisturbed condition. A number of the arable fields within the village have evidence of 'ridge and furrow'.

COMMUNITY PLANS





Need to adopt a parish emergency plan as the Resilience Forum Plans did not coordinate efforts at grass roots level.

As stated previously, the neighbourhood plan is in progress, but not initiated by Covid or climate emergency. It was started predominantly so that the village could have more say over planning issues.

No. We don't know enough about emergency plans to judge whether we should create one. We do not qualify for a Neighbourhood plan.

Our emergency plan is being reconsidered and we have agreed a Climate Change Committee

Village hall has had wooden gazebo's fitted for outdoor bookings and access to a toilet and kitchenette, re-done patio and path.

New changing rooms for sports. Pocket park, wild flower areas..

Village Hall survey planned to try and discover what the community requires of a village hall in the 21st century.

Community connectors, now working with health and wellbeing for all age groups.

Play, woodland/sensory garden, community managed library, refurb hard surface games area/courts.

Biodiversity group emerged from the Neighbourhood Plan work


Just rolled out changeover from SOX to LED lighting on 60 lamps around the parish. Area around the allotments has been seeded as a wildflower meadow.

Longer term and much more planning, trying to wild flower verges as appropriate.

We would very much like a play/green space area but have no access to land.

Parish council is looking at developing a green strategy.

Memorial garden, linear village green.

The village playing field is a newish project, 4 years, we are hoping to improve wildlife area, the old playing field, which is on edge of village, Also planting bulbs and did flowers to enhance the verges.

Renovation of local pond to provide dipping platform and better environment for wildlife and residents.

Bus stop shelter has become the Village Library.


Looking at our communications approach, to make sure we reach all residents.

A separate charity has been set up to develop a children's play area and community open space. Although separate this group updates the Parish Council on progress. The Parish Council are in the early stages of a biodiversity project and all councillors are keen to try and encourage residents to set up a biodiversity group. The Parish Council are working to bring a Memorial Garden under the management of a charity committee.

The social aspect of our village is very badly affected by a dangerous & unsuitable main road which bisects it. The inability of the County Council to deal with this over 30 years has made planning very difficult. We are hopeful that the provision of a bus pass will change this. We keep our fingers crossed.

There are no formal schemes, but support for neighbours is good.

Covid Support Group - evolving into Good Neighbourhood Scheme.


Community is so small, we are able to keep an eye on everyone.

Good Neighbours Scheme - not formally registered and set up in response to Covid-19.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT GROUPS



From August 2022 our Good Neighbours Schemes (GNS) start up support for new and existing community support groups in the north of the county, is now available countywide!

Our funding of up to £700, (to cover group start-up costs), together with support 8 guidance from our Fieldworkers, includes assessment of need (how many people could benefit from a scheme in your area) and every step of the way to becoming a Good Neighbours Scheme. We don't stop there; we are also available to provide on-going assistance after joining our growing Network. With our regular newsletters, lively zoom meetings, we aim to provide a wealth of useful information and get people connected across the county sharing ideas, experiences and supporting each other.

Any eligible community support groups that could benefit from our help may be considered, to enable them to start up or to continue to offer that added value they can contribute to their communities.
